NSW **BUSHFIRE APPEAL**





CHRISTMAS IN CANBERRA

Thank you to everyone who donated to the Anglicare Christmas Appeal 2016. Over \$53,000 was raised to assist people who were doing it tough over the Christmas period.


THE HOME STRETCH – FINISHING WHAT WE STARTED

Supporting 18 year-olds who are on their own after leaving Care.

An 18th birthday is usually cause for celebration but for young people living in state care, it means being forced out on your own. Within one year, 50% of state care leavers will be unemployed, in jail, homeless or become a new parent. These are statistics that Anglicare/St Saviours want to see changed.

Two years ago Anglicare St Saviours began a pilot program called Transition to Leaving Care (TLC) which gave ongoing support to young people after leaving care. The incredible results showed that all of the participants found the support beneficial or extremely beneficial. In October, The Feed SBS youth news program captured the story of a young person, Lily, who took part in the pilot. Lily expressed her huge appreciation for the support, highlighting the difference it's made in her life.

Anglicare's national Home Stretch campaign seeks government commitment to extend support for young people until the age of 21.

HARLEY'S STORY

Eighteen year old Harley is a top student who has recently enrolled at the University of Technology Sydney. He has also lived in foster care for over 10 years.

Harley's future looks bright and is a testament to both his own hard work and the love and support he received from his foster carers, Shirley and Vera.

"I was 7 when I transitioned into care," says Harley. "And while the hardest part about being in care is being separated from your biological family - it's a confusing thing for a young child to go through – but the best part, at least for me, is that I got a second family. Shirley and Vera cared for me and made me feel like I had a home."

Unlike many other children, Harley remained with the same permanent carers for the entire time he was in care.

He says that it's this stability that helped make life so much easier. It also made the transition out of care easier too.

"St Saviours staff have always been positive and supportive and prepared me for leaving care. And knowing that I have a home with Shirley and Vera means that I'm not worried about the future but I'm excited," he says.

Having completed his HSC and winning a scholarship to study Information Technology, Harley is now enrolled in a Bachelor of Information Technology and Diploma of Professional Practice. He also has lined up a part time job so that he can support himself as he finishes his studies. His plans are to work in network security or as a systems administrator.

CONNECTING ABORIGINAL CHILDREN TO CULTURE WAGGA WAGGA

The Murrabinya Wanggaay Cultural Program is an exciting initiative being launched at the Wanggaay Koori Out of Home Care Service in Wagga Wagga. Coordinator Tangerene Ingram says that the program aims to connect Aboriginal children and young people who are living in care to their culture.

"Although children are placed with Aboriginal carers, it doesn't always mean that they are exposed to cultural activities in the local and surrounding areas," says Tangerene.

The program meets a real need for local children and young people. Case workers at the Wanggaay Koori service see first-hand what academic evidence also indicates: children who have strong cultural connections, identity and have strong community ties have more positive outcomes later in life when leaving the care system.

The 12 week program includes exposure to Aboriginal storytelling, folklore, traditional life, cultural sites, arts and craft, and language taught by 'aunties' and 'uncles' from the community.

WAGGA WAGGA

Meet the newest graduates of Anglicare's Home Interaction Program for Parents and Youngsters (HIPPY) in Wagga Wagga.

HIPPY is a two-year, home-based, early learning and parenting program for families with young children. HIPPY supports parents in becoming their children's first teacher and helps foster a love of learning from a young age.

During the two years, tutors make weekly or fortnightly home visits to each family and role-play with the parents to equip them to lead their child in their learning.

NEW PARTNERSHIP

GOULBURN

New agreements between the Department of Family and Community Services, Anglicare Goulburn and the Goulburn local police mean improved 'safer pathways' for women, with or without children, who are leaving violence and at risk of homelessness or requiring crisis accommodation to be safe.

"Domestic violence is a serious social problem. These agreements improve communication between services to ensure that women and children fleeing domestic violence receive the best immediate and long-term help." says Anglicare's Manager of Housing and Social Services, Toni Reay.

Anglicare is increasing service capacity across Goulburn Mulwaree, Upper Lachlan and Yass Valley regions with extended operating hours to provide after hours support to women in crisis.

HYAP FUNDING

RIVERINA

Anglicare was awarded a contract with the NSW Department of Family and Community Services (FACS) to deliver the Homeless Youth Assistance Program (HYAP) at Wagga Wagga and the broader Murrumbidgee Region.

HYAP assists young people aged 12 to 15 years who are homeless or at risk of homelessness, providing information, advocacy and liaising with Specialist Homelessness Services (SHS) and other community services providers, to support young people to remain or return home if safe and appropriate, or help them find suitable accommodation.
