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Protecting Her

*Laura was only 15 years old when, after years of bullying and abuse, she left home. After trying to survive on the streets, in shelters and 'couch surfing' in dangerous environments, Laura approached Anglicare's Club 12/25 youth services for emergency relief and help through the youth education program (YEP). Today her life is transformed.

"The staff didn't give up on me – even when I was difficult to work with. I have hope now," says Laura, who is now studying social work at TAFE.

Laura is one of thousands of people assisted through Anglicare's services in the last year.



A message from the CEO

Social researcher Hugh Mackay called on Australians to build up their local neighbourhoods in his recent book The Art of Belonging. The fragmentation of our community is making us more isolated. Loneliness is now a mass social phenomena with nearly one third of Australians living in single person households. A majority of us don't trust our neighbours reflecting the fact that we simply don't know them. Says Mackay: "a good life is not lived in isolation... a good life is lived at the heart of a thriving community, among people we trust, and within an environment of mutual respect." At heart, Anglicare's mission seeks to address the decline of care that help strengthen rural and other marginalized communities which for-profits will eschew.

We want all people to be heard and valued. We want them to know that there is a network of people that they can trust when they are alone or times are tough.



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St George's Hub in Parkes

Georgie's Pantry, a joint initiative between Anglicare and St George's parish in Parkes NSW, supports hundreds of people every year by providing discounted groceries and emergency assistance.





Anglicare also helped to fund emergency food services across the region. Locations included St Johns Care, Club12/25 youth centre and Gordon Community Centre in Canberra, Wagga Wagga, Orange/Ralston, Eden, Goulburn, Young and Yass.

Disability: Embracing Ministries and chaplaincy



Embracing Ministries nurtures the spiritual life of families, children and young people with special needs. The service also educates churches. Anglicare's partnership with Embracing Ministries is currently providing chaplaincy support for people accessing disability services in the ACT. There is an aim to grow the partnership with Embracing Ministries also providing retreats, music groups and mentoring programs.

Childcare assistance for vulnerable children

Throughout the last year, Anglicare has been able to provide specialised assistance to vulnerable families with complex childcare needs. Anglicare also continued to run the Paint and Play community program in the ACT. This initiative gives parents and caregivers the opportunity to meet with staff, learn parenting skills and identify any developmental needs with their child.

Retirement Living:

Chaplaincy and pastoral support

Ensuring emotional and social support for residents of Retirement Living Villages remains a focus for Anglicare, particularly through the provision of chaplaincy support.

Cassie's Place/Cassie's Nest Child Sexual Assault Counselling

Anglicare identified an urgent need for specialised therapeutic counselling services on the NSW South Coast. As a response, the Cassie's Nest service was developed and sits as a complementary service alongside the Cassie's Place initiative which provides specialist counselling for children and adolescents specifically affected by sexual assault. Over the last year Anglicare developed a concept, vision statement and business plan. Senior psychologist, Kate Gentle, commenced earlier in the year to begin delivering the specialised counselling service. Children in Out of Home Care (foster care) are already benefitting. This service will be expanded to other agencies and the general public. It's been well received by FaCs, Brighter Futures and IMPACT who have began referrals to this service.

Youth services (Ignite Mentoring)

Anglicare's mentoring programs operate in the Riverina region and include community mentoring for at-risk young people, as well as mentoring for young people in the juvenile justice system. The program so far has seen a 100 per cent success rate with no young people reoffending.

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Disaster Recovery and Emergency Bushfire Grants

The Carwoola bushfires devastated rural properties and homes near Canberra in February. Anglicare volunteers were there to assist during the disaster and provided ongoing assistance to those affected in the months after. Counselling services as well as Coles/Myer vouchers were given to households that were affected. Ongoing support continues through a community Listening Post initiative where people can seek further emotional support.
