

# **Emergency Services Australia Open Day 2017**

On Sunday 29 October Emergency Services Australia (ESA) held an open day at Emergency Services headquarters, next to Canberra Airport to allow the general public to meet the people who keep their communities safe. The action packed Open Day which also included a visit from a Squirril helicopter, was a way to connect with the community in an inspiring and positive light providing an opportunity to learn about the services which come together in times of need.

Anglicare Disaster Recovery volunteers participated in the 'Evacuation Centre' zone of the event, sharing with visitors the role in which Anglicare plays during a disaster.

Alongside Red Cross, Salvation Army, Pastoral Care and ADRA, members of our dedicated DR volunteer team chatted with locals about the services available during and after a disaster.

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#### **Helicopters and Heroes**

It was a typical spring morning as I arrived at the Emergency Services Australia (ESA) Open Day. There was excitement in the air as I followed a family toward the friendly ESA staff member handing out blue 'show bags' to hold all the goodies I would collect throughout the day.

I reported to the 'evacuation centre' tent and met up with the other Anglicare volunteers for the morning. I saw some other familiar faces amongst the Chaplains and Red Cross volunteers. It felt like a bit of a reunion, because after chatting with some families who came through the a variety of 'super heroes', with each evacuation centre, I headed off to see some firemen cut a car to pieces using the Jaws of Life. It was incredible to see how guickly a tonne of metal could be reduced to multiple pieces of scrap, like scissors cutting paper.

I visited fellow volunteers at the Rural Fire Service (RFS) and SES stalls and we chatted about what role we all play in a disaster. It was great to share what draws us as volunteers to want to help under extreme circumstances. It was interesting how some of us want to battle the elements, such as fires and storms, while others are moved to assist the people who have been impacted by these elements. We shared our mutual admiration for the skills we each bring to these situations.

I toured the ESA headquarters and saw how incidents were monitored by team member having a codename such as Batman, Spiderman or Wonder Woman. Very appropriate since they protect the ACT from impending disasters!

The highlight of the day came when I went for a spin over Canberra City

in a Squirrel helicopter. This was my first time in one of these amazing machines and I could barely contain my excitement, though managed not to squeal as we ascended over the airport. The sky was clear and the lake looked amazing from the air. It was over all too soon and I consoled myself with some fairy floss provided by ACT Community Services.

When I volunteered for the ESA Open Day, I had no idea how much I would get out of the day myself. I left with a full show bag and several items ticked off my bucket list!

two Museums and St Luke's, Junee and the Junee Show Society. I enjoy


I am currently the South Pacific Area
