SOUTH COAST FINANCIAL COUNSELLING SERVICE

Two new financial counsellors have joined the Anglicare South Coast team, with another addition expected in Goulburn soon. Funding for financial counselling in the region increased following the Black Summer Bushfires, and with many families still impacted by that devastation now facing high interest rates and high food costs, the need for financial assistance continues.

Anglicare Coordinator, Kirsty Daley, based in the Ashmont Community Resource Centre, says they are seeing more new clients, those who have never needed financial support before, and that more clients are keeping their appointments then in the past. "We have noticed a lot of clients coming to us because of the interest rate hikes, those who had to stretch themselves to purchase homes."

Volunteer FEATURE

The Gordon Community Centre, run in partnership by Anglicare and the Lanyon Valley Anglican Church, would not run so well at all without its team of volunteersespecially long-term volunteer Pat Houghton.

For going on 5 years, Pat has been an integral part of the centre. She is heavily involved in the food pantry operation and has used her 20 years of child care experience to run the Wednesday playgroup sessions since they began.

"I was working for Anglicare's Calwell Early Childcare Centre when the Gordon Community Centre opened and I was sent over to help set up the playgroup" she said. Once the playgroup was up and running, Pat decided to stay on as a volunteer-and she's stayed on ever since. "Back when we started we had maybe 5 or 6 children." she said. "Last week we had 19 and sometimes it is as high as 25!"

A highlight for Pat is planning holiday playgroup sessions, making little Christmas presents for all the children" she said. Pat also planned a special Easter craft for a session earlier this month.

Pat's efforts with the onsite food pantry are another way she's become essential to the Gordon team. "Pat is one of the longest serving volunteers in the Pantry. We are grateful for the support she is able to provide to newer volunteers, and the additional time and energy she puts into our Christmas activities", said Gordon Community Centre Coordinator Rose Flintoff.

The pantry is open twice a week for community members struggling to make ends meet. Participants receive bags of food and other necessities such as toiletries and laundry detergent. Food donations come from OZHarvest and occasionally local bakeries or shops. Generous



community members donate dry goods and financial gifts which are used to fill in the gaps.

"We don't always have everything we'd like, said Pat, but we do the best we can". With increasing numbers of clients "we have needed to get creative. Sometimes we won't source hair conditioner so we can afford more shampoo, as that's more essential."

When asked what motivates her as a volunteer, Pat responded that the support she receives from the staff and other volunteers has brought her through some and commitment to the Gordon Community Centre has done the same for many of the vulnerable clients and young families she has helped through the years. without volunteers like Pat.

THREAD TOGETHER IN PARKES





Following the unprecedented flooding in the Parkes region last November, Anglicare partner Thread Together coordinated with the local Anglicare team to provide essential clothing, shoes and towels to impacted individuals and families, many of whom lost everything.

Thread Together works to prevent excess clothing and materials from ending up in landfills by rerouting them to those in need. Their relationships with fashion industry partners means the materials they source come brand new, direct from the manufacturer.

Anglicare is pleased to announce that Thread Together plans to continue to their presence in Parkes by opening a clothing hub based in Georgie's Pantry. The pantry, and associated op shop, Georgie's Boutique, are run in partnership by Anglicare and the Anglican Parish of Parkes.

There continues to be great need in the region. "Families have been displaced," said Anglicare Coordinator for Parkes, Ann Olson. "Many have had to move in with their parents or into their children's homes. There are no caravans left and the rental crisis is making things even harder."

By providing flood victims and other vulnerable community members in Parkes access to free clothing and other essentials, Thread Together brings a sense of dignity and hope as the community rebuilds.

BUSHFIRE RECOVERY FINANCIAL COUNSELLING

For many of us the Black Summer Bushfires have become a distant memory. The pandemic, flooding, rental crises and rising interest rates have taken our attention in turns.

Yet, for those who were impacted, daily reminders of the devastation continue, and for Anglicare Bushfire Recovery Financial Counsellor, Chris Heckenberg, the job of helping is still ongoing.

In the immediate aftermath of the fires, everyone from the Red Cross to the Army came to help, Chris remembers. Chris was there with them summing up a person in the flesh." he at the start. He joined the Anglicare Bushfire Recovery Response Team, as a Financial Counsellor working across the whole of the Snowy Mountains, Monaro and Snowy Valleys.

"Given the devastating loss many who came to see me had experienced, I was extremely aware from the outset that I had to use a trauma informed

approach in all my client work," said Chris. "Many of the people I support were too bewildered in the immediate aftermath of the fires to act. Making long-term decisions are difficult for those impacted by trauma. I offered to draw up a "Road Map" for them setting out each step and crossing off each task as they reached each of their destinations along the way."

"I found when working in rural areas it is particularly important to meet face to face with people. Community leaders, service providers and clients all appreciate checking-out and said

Nearly three and a half years have passed since the fires and while most, if not all, services are now gone Chris is still on the ground battling for his clients. Still on the same journey with clients as they face insurance companies, unscrupulous building companies and additional local

government building regulations which leave them with no options but to live in shipping containers and caravans for years to come. And experiencing some nice wins along the way too of course.


"I would never give up my job, he said. "It's being invited to share in the journey of recovery by these beautiful, resilient people who make it all worthwhile."

NEW LEARNER DRIVER PROGRAM

Anglicare will soon pilot a Learner Driver Program for a select group of young people in the ACT who would otherwise struggle to fulfil Access Canberra's updated requirements for a Coordinator for Youth and Family provisional drivers licence.

The ACT's introduction of the Graduated Licencing Scheme in required to hold their learners licence for 12 months, and complete 100 hours of supervised driving, including 10 hours at night. This is a big change from the previous requirement of 6 months and zero supervised hours. For the vulnerable young people participating in Anglicare's Cyclops

young carers program or Junction Youth Services, access to a vehicle and suitable supervision is a challenge. Daniel Gaffney, Anglicare's Services in the ACT came up with the concept for the pilot program. "For young people without a robust support system in place, the new requirement could prevent them from attaining their provisional licence at all." he said.

young people to obtain a provisional licence it will prevent them from missing out on employment and housing opportunities in the future and help them become safe, confident drivers." said Daniel.

The initial program will work with five young people, nominated from Anglicare services, by providing access to a registered vehicle and a volunteer to supervise their driving hours. Before beginning the program, participants must hold a valid leaners licence and complete seven formal driving lessons with support from Anglicare.

Anglicare has already commenced selecting participants for the program and supporting them to complete their seven required driving lessons.
